House Education Conforming Bill PCB PKB 25-01 (HB 5101) - K12 Highlights

HB PCB PKB 25-01 conforms law to the General Appropriations Act proposed by the House of Representatives for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 for prekindergarten through grade 12 education. According to the Florida House of Representatives, specifically, the bill conforms statutes to the General Appropriations Act proposed by the House of Representatives for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 for prekindergarten through grade 12 education:

- Modifies the forecasting requirements of the Education Estimating Conference.
- Modifies certain procedural requirements relating to the application, verification, and funding of the Family Empowerment Scholarship and Florida Tax Credit Scholarship programs to prioritize the full use of tax credit revenue, ensure the timely distribution of funds based upon the student's educational choice, reduce or eliminate any prior year scholarship adjustments made to the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP), and ensure the appropriate recovery of state funds if such funds were improperly received or retained.
- Specifies the dates for the completion of four full-time equivalent (FTE) surveys and which FEFP categoricals are included in the recalculation of the FEFP.
- Reduces the amount of the add-on weights applied to certain types of students and school districts funded In the FEFP.
- Repeals the Educational Enrollment Stabilization Program.
- Requires the Auditor General to annually examine the state's scholarship programs established in chapter 1002, F.S., for compliance with laws relating to the classification of FTE funded in the FEFP.

The bill makes the following changes to the FEFP:

- Amends the exceptional student education funding model by authorizing school districts with fewer than 10,000 FTE and fewer than three exceptional student education support levels IV and V to receive the Exceptional Student Education Guaranteed Allocation established in s. 1011.62(8), F.S.
- Reduces by 50 percent the value of the add-on weights for FTE students who earn either a passing score on the subject examination or receive a corresponding certificate for Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), Advanced International Certificate Education (AICE), dual enrollment, and CAPE courses or earn an AP Capstone, AICE, or IB diploma.
- Amends the methodology for prorating the FEFP when such proration is required.
- Clarifies which categoricals are included in the recalculation of the FEFP.
- Moves the State-funded Discretionary Supplement in s. 1011.62, F.S., to a new section of the statute to ensure that the supplement is not included in proration.
- Repeals the Educational Enrollment Stabilization program.

Senate Education Conforming Bill 2510 - Prekindergarten Through Grade 12 Education Highlights

SPB 2510 conforms statutes to the funding decisions related to prekindergarten through grade 12 education in the Senate-proposed General Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2025-2026. The bill:

- Modifies virtual instruction to allow school districts to receive full-time equivalent student completions through
 virtual programs, including those where students were first reported during the summer. The bill also modifies
 the definition of full-time equivalent student for virtual instruction programs to include summer enrollment.
- Modifies CAPE Digital Tool Certificates and CAPE industry certification funding, including changes to the additional full-time equivalent membership, and modifies the requirements of the CAPE Industry Certification Funding List.
- Modifies the School Recognition program, limiting the bonuses to only instructional personnel, rather than all faculty and staff.
- Reduces the amount of the add-on weights applied to certain types of students and school districts funded in the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP).
- Modifies the distribution of FEFP funds to the school districts to a monthly distribution rather than bimonthly.
 This bill is expected to provide an overall positive fiscal impact on state expenditures. See Section V., Fiscal Impact Statement. The bill takes effect July 1, 2025.
