### THE FLORIDA SENATE: BALANCED BUDGET REDUCES STATE SPENDING, GROWS STRONG RESERVES

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#### **Balanced Budget Reduces State Spending, Grows Strong Reserves**

*Pays down state debt, lowers per capita spending, reduces growth of state government  
Accounts for broad-based tax relief, new reporting requirements to safeguard tax dollars*

**Tallahassee**—Senate Bill 2500, the General Appropriations Act, Florida's state budget for the upcoming fiscal year, was finalized Friday, beginning the constitutionally required 72-hour cooling off period before a final vote set for this evening. This fiscally responsible, balanced budget reduces state spending, lowers per capita spending, and reduces the growth of state bureaucracy. The budget and associated bills authorize early payoff of state debt, account for significant, broad-based tax relief, and increase historic state reserves for emergencies. New reporting requirements throughout the budget safeguard taxpayer dollars, improving accountability, transparency, and oversight of government spending.

"On the heels of historic state revenue balances and influxes of time-limited federal stimulus funds related to the pandemic, our revenue forecasts, while still growing, have stabilized. This year we are right-sizing our budget for the long-term, spending less, while setting aside robust rainy-day funds, and accounting for meaningful, broad-based tax relief," **said Senate President Ben Albritton (R-Wauchula)**. "Floridians expect us to spend their tax dollars wisely. Florida has a great framework for accountability and transparency, but we can always do better. Throughout this budget we are implementing new ways to collect meaningful data to measure outcomes and ensure taxpayer resources are being utilized wisely."

"It's Florida's private sector, not the government, that creates the jobs that build thriving communities across our state. We want to maintain a lean and efficient state workforce and not grow a bureaucratic administrative state that stands as a barrier to innovation and prosperity. Florida already has the smallest state workforce per capita in the country. Our budget reduces the growth in state government by eliminating long-term vacant positions. At the same time, we are working to retain the talented and dedicated workers who serve in state government with an across-the-board salary increase to address inflation, and targeted raises for some of the most difficult jobs in state government, including state law enforcement and firefighters," **said Senator Hooper (R-Clearwater), Chair of the Senate Committee on Appropriations**.

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“We are continuing to build out a resilient transportation, housing, health care, public safety, and clean water infrastructure that can accommodate significant population growth over the next decade. That includes targeted investments in our agriculture supply chain,” **continued President Albritton**. “As Floridians, love for the environment is in our DNA. This budget continues longstanding efforts to preserve our environment and natural resources for future generations of Floridians and visitors. We also fund innovative programs to serve the most vulnerable among us including those with disabilities, our veterans, the poor, and our fellow Floridians struggling with substance abuse and mental health challenges, along with strong outcome-driven reporting so we can measure how well these efforts are serving Floridians in need.”

“This budget reflects a return to a more normal budget spending pattern, aligned with our revenues over the long-term. Our revenues are increasing, but instead of spending all of we have, we are paying down debt, setting aside reserves, and creating opportunities for significant tax relief, so Floridians can keep more of their hard-earned money,” **continued Chair Hooper**. “We are also making critical investments in our transportation and clean water infrastructure and keeping parents in the driver’s seat with record funding for both school choice opportunities and our legacy, neighborhood public schools.”

SB 2500 makes major investments in Florida’s transportation and clean water infrastructure and dedicates significant resources for Florida’s environment, including Everglades Restoration, citrus recovery, and the preservation of working farms and ranches along Florida’s Wildlife Corridor to support Florida’s vital agriculture supply chain. The bill provides record funding for K-12 public schools and school choice opportunities for Florida parents as well as career and technical education and training provided by both school districts and colleges.

Senate Bill 2500 appropriates \$115.1 billion, or \$3.5 billion less than the adjusted total budget for the 2024-25 fiscal year (\$118.6 billion), as noted in Florida’s Fiscal Analysis In Brief. The budget eliminates certain vacant positions, reducing the growth of the state workforce. The budget also authorizes early pay off of \$830 million in state debt.

A budget adjusted for an anticipated CPI of 3% would total \$122.19 billion. A budget adjusted by official estimates for population growth would total \$120.19 billion. A budget of \$115.1 billion holds the line, spending less than last year and reducing per capita spending.

Later today, the Senate will also consider the following bills associated with the state budget:

### **\$1.3 Billion in Tax Savings for Families and Businesses**

HB 7031: This targeted tax relief legislation permanently eliminates the business rent tax and offers broad-based tax relief opportunities for Florida’s families and seniors, expanding efforts to keep essentials tax free. The bill permanently eliminates the sales tax on many disaster and hurricane preparedness supplies as well as several safety and health-related items. HB 7031 creates a permanent Back-to-School Sales Tax Holiday for the month of August and a new sales tax holiday in the fall for Floridians exercising their constitutional right to hunt and fish. The bill

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lays the foundation for a constitutional amendment to reduce or eliminate property taxes for voter consideration during the 2026 general election.

### **\$830 Million in Debt Reduction**

SB 1906, Debt Reduction, by President Pro Tempore Jason Brodeur (R-Sanford), creates a recurring Debt Reduction Program within the State Board of Administration (SBA) to reduce the state's debt through early repayment of state bonds and provides for an annual transfer of \$250 million for the program. Additionally, SB 2500 includes \$580 million for additional debt repayment during the 2025-26 Fiscal Year.

### **Constitutional Amendment To Increase Rainy Day Funds**

Senate Joint Resolution (SJR) 1908 by Chair Hooper proposes an amendment to the Florida Constitution to increase the amount of funds that may be retained in the Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF) from 10% to 25% of general revenue collections. The joint resolution requires the Legislature to make an annual transfer of the lesser of \$750 million or the amount necessary to reach the 25 percent threshold unless there is revenue shortfall. The SJR authorizes the Legislature to withdraw funds under certain circumstances to address critical state needs.

### **President Pro Tempore Brodeur, Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment and General Government:**

"We are continuing our longstanding efforts to preserve Florida's unique natural resources and making critical improvements to our environment and clean water infrastructure. These investments benefit current and future generations of Floridians, while also safeguarding Florida's economy as our pristine natural features continue to attract visitors from across the country and around the world. We are also dedicating significant funds to preserving and expanding our iconic citrus industry, which is key to Florida's overall economy as citrus production, harvesting, packing and shipping creates steady, good-paying jobs in rural, heritage communities across Florida's Heartland. We continue to have a tremendous focus on Florida's Wildlife Corridor and the conservation easements we need to get the Corridor connected quickly before the opportunity is gone."

### **Senator Ileana Gracia (R-Miami), Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Civil and Criminal Justice:**

"Our budget reflects a balanced approach to addressing key priorities in corrections, juvenile justice, law enforcement, and the court system, including significant, targeted pay raises to help address recruitment and retention of the law enforcement officers who protect our state. To increase and incentivize people to seek careers in law enforcement, we are also dedicating funds for law enforcement apprenticeships, which help pay salaries while new hires are in training."

"Once again this year, Florida taxpayers will make an unprecedented investment in our children's education, including a significant increase in funding for public schools and our K-12 scholarships. In our new environment of universal choice, where the money follows the student,

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our public schools are still the first choice for the majority of families. Our budget increases per student funding for our neighborhood public schools and raises our annual investment in teacher raises to more than \$1.35 billion.”

“We know students are best served when education is linked to the realities and opportunities of the economy and the job market. Along those lines we are enhancing our commitment to Career and Technical Education opportunities with support for school districts and colleges that create or expand these vital programs. In our university system, we maintain the low cost of tuition for in-state students and make other targeted investments in specific programs, including the Florida Center for Autism and Neurodevelopment at UF to develop and implement the programs and services as provided for in SB 112, which the Governor signed into law last month.”

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## Florida House Passes Historic Budget and Tax Relief Package, Putting Floridians First

**TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (June 16, 2025)**—The Florida House of Representatives today passed a historic and fiscally conservative budget for Fiscal Year 2025–2026, along with the most significant recurring tax relief package in state history. Together, these two landmark achievements reflect the House's continued commitment to responsible government, long-term financial stewardship, and delivering meaningful results for everyday Floridians.

This year's \$115.1 billion state budget represents a \$3.8 billion reduction from the previous year—a 3.2% decrease in total spending. The budget reduces the size of state government by nearly 2,000 positions, while preserving essential services and investing in the state's highest priorities. The budget retains a robust \$12.4 billion in total reserves, including \$7 billion in unallocated General Revenue, \$4.9 billion in the fully-funded Budget Stabilization Fund, and \$500 million in the Emergency Preparedness and Response Fund.

The House championed **HJR 5019**, a proposed constitutional amendment that would **significantly expand and strengthen Florida's Budget Stabilization Fund**. The amendment would raise the cap on the fund from 10% to 25% of net General Revenue collections, require annual deposits of \$750 million until the cap is reached, and allow withdrawals for critical state needs with two-thirds legislative approval. This reform will further insulate the state from economic downturns and emergency costs. Importantly, because it amends the Florida Constitution, this proposal will appear on the 2026 ballot for voter approval, allowing Floridians to directly endorse a stronger long-term fiscal safeguard for the state.

In addition, the House passed **HB 5017**, creating a first-in-its-kind **Debt Reduction Program**. This initiative provides a recurring **\$250 million transfer** from General Revenue to the State Board of Administration each year, beginning July 1, 2025. These funds will accelerate the early retirement of outstanding tax-supported state bonds, excluding transportation debt, saving taxpayers millions in future interest costs, reducing Florida's long-term liabilities and reinforcing the state's AAA credit rating.

"Florida's financial future is secure because of the conservative and historic budget passed today," said **House Speaker Daniel Perez**. "It is rare for government to voluntarily shrink its budget. It is even more rare to have a group of leaders more focused on saving for the future, instead of needlessly spending in the present. This unprecedented, conservative budget will secure our state's financial future and continue to



invest in the priorities that have made Florida a nationwide leader in economic growth, education, public safety and individual freedom.”

“This budget reflects disciplined leadership and a long-term vision for Florida,” added **Representative Lawrence McClure**, Chair of the Budget Committee. “We’ve taken decisive action to reduce debt, build record deserves, and ensure our state is financially prepared for whatever challenges might lie ahead. At the same time, we’ve made strategic investments all without growing the size of government or compromising our conservative values. Every decision was made with one goal in mind: putting Floridians first.”

### **Targeted Investments in Core Priorities**

Despite a smaller budget, the Florida House maintained strategic investments in the state’s most critical areas.

In **education**, the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP) receives \$29.5 billion, a \$945 million increase over the previous year. Per-student funding rises to \$9,130—the highest in state history. The budget includes \$102 million in salary increases for experienced classroom teachers and ensures continued funding for Bright Futures Scholarships. Importantly, there are no tuition increases for Florida’s public colleges or universities.

In **public safety**, the House has prioritized law enforcement and criminal justice. Grants totaling \$14.4 million will help recruit and support sheriff’s deputies and county officers. The Florida Highway Patrol will receive over \$20 million for vehicle replacements, ballistic equipment, and advanced in-car video systems. Additionally, more than \$100 million was allocated to stabilize operations and improve health care services within the Department of Corrections. There is also an increase of over \$55 million in salary increases for state law enforcement officers and state firefighters.

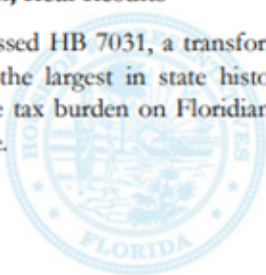
The **environment** remains a core priority. The House secured \$810 million for Everglades restoration, the largest single-year commitment in the state’s history. Another \$461 million is directed toward water quality improvements, stormwater upgrades, and wastewater infrastructure across Florida. The Rural and Family Lands Protection Program is funded at \$250 million to preserve Florida’s natural heritage. Additional funds are included for coral reef restoration, springs protection, and sea-level rise resilience.

For **emergency preparedness**, the state sets aside \$500 million in response funds and nearly \$850 million in total funding when including federal disaster recovery support. These investments ensure Florida is equipped to handle natural disasters and other statewide emergencies.

In **health care**, the budget reflects a commitment to vulnerable Floridians by funding the Florida KidCare program to serve more than 213,000 children and increasing Medicaid rates for nursing homes and rural health clinics. The budget provides over \$246 million to increase nursing home rates, \$100 million to expand forensic mental health treatment and combat opioid addiction, \$44.2 million for the Integrated Plan for Person with Developmental Disabilities Pilot Program, and new investments in Alzheimer’s services, veterans’ health programs and early childhood intervention through the Early steps program. The budget also doubles cancer research funding and includes targeted funding to expand access to care for seniors, foster families and underserved communities.

### **Landmark Tax Relief: Real Reform, Real Results**

Alongside the budget, the House passed HB 7031, a transformative tax package that delivers nearly \$1.3 billion in recurring state tax cuts—the largest in state history. The package is a defining example of responsible governance: reducing the tax burden on Floridians while intentionally limiting the growth of government through reduced revenue.



“This tax package is not just the largest recurring tax cut in state history; it is a structural reform that reins in the size of government and puts Floridians back in control of their own money,” said **Speaker Perez**. “We delivered permanent tax relief for working families, our most vulnerable and small businesses. From affordable housing to disaster preparedness to local infrastructure, these reforms will make Florida more livable and more competitive. And by reducing recurring revenue, we’ve removed the temptation for future lawmakers to grow government beyond what’s necessary. It’s not just conservative, it’s transformational.”

“We remain committed to making Florida more affordable, putting more money back into the pockets of hardworking Floridians and supporting our small businesses,” said **Representative Wyman Duggan**, Chair of the Ways & Means Committee. “In this year’s tax package, we emphasized making tax holidays permanent and expanded existing exemptions so Floridians can take greater advantage of real, lasting savings. Our goal is simple, return as much money as possible back to the people of Florida.”

Key provisions include **disaster preparedness**, where essential items such as batteries, generators, and smoke detectors are now permanently exempt from sales tax. The package also ensures that fiscally constrained counties are reimbursed for property tax refunds issued to homes damaged by hurricanes.

In addition, the tax package includes the **permanent extension of the Back-to-School Sales Tax Holiday**, which will now run the entire month of August, helping families save annually on essential school supplies. A new **Hunting, Fishing, and Camping Sales Tax Holiday** will span from September through December, easing costs for outdoor recreational items.

The tax package also supports local investment and infrastructure. It allows local governments to **reduce or repeal certain discretionary sales surtaxes** with a two-thirds vote. It permits fiscally constrained Gulf counties to use up to 10% of Tourist Development tax revenue for infrastructure and allow all coastal counties to use this revenue for beach lifeguards. It extends local enterprise zone incentives through 2035 to sustain long-term job-creating projects, and requires communications service tax revenue to be prioritized for timely utility permit processing.

The legislation delivers major protections for **homeowners**, including improved transparency in property assessments, earlier evidence disclosure, and expanded access to remote hearings. On **affordable housing**, the bill provides new exemptions for developments on state-owned and government-owned lands, and strengthens the “Missing Middle” workforce housing program by allowing tax benefits to be retained after a change in ownership. The bill also expands two existing affordable housing programs to allow for benefits when a project is leased from a housing finance authority.

**Florida businesses** will benefit from the complete elimination of the state’s **business rent tax**, making the state more competitive and encouraging job creation. Additional provisions eliminate the aviation fuel tax, extend tax exemptions for data centers and natural gas fuel, and prevent local governments from increasing communication services taxes for the next five years.

Additional tax relief supports **Gold Seal-certified child care providers**, offers a new **Home Away from Home Tax Credit** to help house families of critically ill children, and **doubles funding** from beverage tax revenues for the state’s top cancer and neurological research.

### A Blueprint for Florida’s Future

Together, this year’s budget and tax package deliver on the House’s core promises: responsible spending, lower taxes, strategic investment, and a strong safeguard against government overreach.



“We believe in smaller government, lower taxes, and greater freedom—and this session proves it,” concluded **Speaker Perez**. “Florida continues to lead the way for what conservative governance can accomplish when we put people first.”

**SECTION 58.** The unexpended balance of General Revenue funds provided to the Department of Education for the Linking Industry to Nursing Education (LINE) Fund in Specific Appropriation 129 of chapter 2024-231, Laws of Florida, shall revert and is appropriated for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 to the Department of Education for the same purpose.

**SECTION 59.** The unexpended balance of General Revenue funds provided to the Department of Education for the Linking Industry to Nursing Education (LINE) Fund in section 79 of chapter 2024-015, Laws of Florida, shall revert and is appropriated for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 to the Department of Education for the same purpose.

## FISCAL YEAR 2025-2026 EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS CONFORMING BILL, SB 2510

The Conference Committee Amendment for SB 2510, relating to Education, conforms law to the appropriations provided in SB 2500, the General Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2025-2026, for prekindergarten through grade 12 education. Specifically, the amendment provides for the following:

**SECTION 1** amends s. 402.22, F.S., to conform cross references related to the changes made in s. 1011.62, F.S., funds for operations of schools.

**SECTION 2** modifies s. 1001.292, F.S., to require the third-party administrator to transfer funds from the Schools of Hope Revolving Loan Program to the Schools of Hope Program when the balance of the Schools of Hope Program falls below \$25 million, beginning July 1, 2027.

**SECTION 3** amends s. 1002.32, F.S., to conform a cross-reference for developmental research (laboratory) schools related to the definition of programs under the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP).

**SECTION 4** amends s. 1002.33, F.S., to conform cross-references for charter schools related to the definition of programs and basic amounts for current operations under the FEFP.

**SECTION 5** modifies s. 1002.333, F.S., related to persistently low-performing schools. The amendment:

- Expands the definition of a persistently low performing school.
- Expands the allowable location for a school of hope based on the availability of underused, vacant, or surplus property.
- Allows state universities and Florida College System institutions to sponsor schools of hope.
- Allows a school of hope to co-locate in an underused, vacant, or surplus public school facility and requires the school district to provide facility-related services.
- Specifies that School of Hope use of underused, vacant, or surplus property is at no cost.
- Provides for continuation of schools of hope funding based on performance metrics set by the State Board of Education (SBE).
- Requires reporting of schools of hope enrollment and performance data.

**SECTION 6** amends s.1002.37, F.S., to conform a cross-reference related to the calculation of full-time equivalent (FTE) student membership in the FEFP for students in the Florida Virtual School.

**SECTION 7** amends s. 1002.411, F.S., to remove new student eligibility for the New Worlds Scholarship Accounts program, but allow parents to spend the remaining funds in an account on qualifying expenditures, and revises the terms of account closure from 3 years of inactivity to 1 year.

**SECTION 8** amends s. 1002.45, F.S., to conform cross references related to the calculation of FTE student membership and basic amounts for current operations in the FEFP for students in district virtual instruction programs.

**SECTION 9** amends s. 1003.4201, F.S., to authorize the school district reading plan to include parent resources for struggling students and information about student eligibility for the New Worlds Reading Initiative.

**SECTION 10** amends s. 1003.4203, F.S., relating to CAPE Digital Tool certificates and industry certifications, to:

- Limit eligibility for CAPE Digital Tool certificates to students in elementary grades, beginning with the 2025-2026 school year.
- Remove requirements related to middle school students and CAPE Digital Tool certificates.
- Rename "CAPE industry certifications" as "Basic CAPE industry certifications" and establish CAPE Basic Non-articulated industry certifications and CAPE Basic Articulated industry certifications.
- Establish CAPE Pathways industry certifications issued to high school students who complete at least three courses and earn an industry certification within a single career and technical education program or program of study, and who exit with a standard high school diploma. Such industry certifications are eligible for additional FEFP funding.

**SECTION 11** amends s. 1003.4935, F.S., to conform cross-references related to the removal of CAPE Digital Tool certificates for middle grades students and to FTE bonus funding.

**SECTION 12** amends s.1003.498, F.S., to conform a cross-reference related to the calculation of FTE student membership in the FEFP for school district virtual course offerings.

**SECTION 13** amends s. 1007.271, F.S., to conform a cross-reference in the dual enrollment program for the calculation of FTE student membership in the FEFP.

**SECTION 14** amends s. 1008.44, F.S., to revise provisions relating to the CAPE Industry Certification Funding List. The amendment:

- Clarifies the assignment of industry certifications to the funding list based on categories.
- Removes the Commissioner of Education's responsibility to recommend revised FTE bonus funding.
- Requires, rather than authorizes, the Commissioner of Education to limit certifications on the funding list to students in certain grades, beginning in the 2026-2027 fiscal year.

**SECTION 15** amends s. 1010.20, F.S., to conform cross references relating to how districts may later transfer or repurpose certain categorical funds under the FEFP.

**SECTION 16** amends s. 1011.61, F.S., to remove the definition of a "full-time equivalent student" relating to a student participating in a student-teacher advisor program, and to conform cross references related to the FEFP.

**SECTION 17** amends s. 1011.62, F.S., to:

- Require school districts to report unduplicated counts of FTE students, including Family Empowerment Scholarship students.
- Require the discretionary millage compression supplement, state-funded discretionary contribution, supplemental allocation for juvenile justice education programs, and safe schools allocation to be recalculated during the fiscal year based on actual FTE student membership.
- Modify the calculation of the educational enrichment allocation and remove a requirement to prorate the allocation in certain conditions.
- Remove the requirement to prorate the exceptional student education guaranteed allocation if recalculated amounts exceed the appropriation.



The section also replaces the weighted FTE funding for specified acceleration options with a new Academic Acceleration Options Supplement as a categorical fund, appropriated annually in the General Appropriations Act. Under the new supplement:

- Each school district receives funding based on its proportionate share of statewide academic acceleration values.
- The student funding weights and teacher bonus amounts assigned to dual enrollment, early graduation, Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, Advanced International Certificate of Education, and CAPE industry certification outcomes remain consistent with current values, but funded through the supplement rather than the FEFP base allocation.
- The CAPE Pathways industry certification bonus is modified to require a standard high school diploma.
- Each school district must annually report its prior-year expenditures of supplement funds to the Legislature, beginning September 1, 2026.

**SECTION 18** amends s. 1011.65, F.S., to remove the requirement for an FEFP allocation conference, and instead require the Department of Education to submit recalculated FEFP data to the Legislature and Governor for written approval prior to releasing the recalculated allocations to school districts.

**SECTION 19** requires the DOE to make recommendations, no later than July 1, 2028, on a Title I performance incentive program to reward Title I schools that have demonstrated excellence in student achievement and learning gains.

**SECTION 20** provides an effective date of July 1, 2025

## FISCAL YEAR 2025-2026 GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT IMPLEMENTING BILL, SB 2502 (EDUCATION EXCERPTS)

The Conference Committee Amendment for SB 2502, relating to Implementing the 2025-2026 General Appropriations Act, provides the following substantive modifications for the 2025-2026 fiscal year:

**SECTION 1** provides legislative intent that the implementing and administering provisions of this act apply to the General Appropriations Act (GAA) for Fiscal Year 2025-2026.

**SECTION 2** incorporates the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP) work papers by reference for the purpose of displaying the calculations used by the Legislature.

**SECTION 3** incorporates the School Readiness Program Reimbursement work papers by reference for the purpose of displaying the rates used in making appropriations for the school readiness program allocation.

**SECTION 124** to implement Specific Appropriations 2423 and 2424 of the 2025-2026 General Appropriations Act:

(1) The Office of Policy and Budget within the Executive Office of the Governor may:

(a) Conduct a review of the functions, procedures, and policies currently in effect for any local governmental entity, local governing authority, or unit of local general-purpose government, as those terms are defined in s. 218.31, Florida Statutes, and any expenditures by such bodies pertaining to local fiscal years ending on September 30, 2024, and September 30, 2025, to identify:

1. Any use of resources to support diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives inconsistent with the law.
2. Any evidence of potential gross overspending, waste, fraud, abuse, or mismanagement of resources.
3. Duplicative or redundant government functions.

(b) For the purpose of these reviews, review the following records:

1. Any personnel costs, administrative overhead costs, contracts and subcontracts, programs, grants and subgrants, any outsourcing with a nongovernment organization, and any other expenditures.
2. Any financial documents, including, but not limited to, annual financial audits; annual budgets; millage reports; annual financial reports; audits of any financial accounts or records, including reports on compliance, internal controls, and management letters; and financial statements, audits, accountability, or status reports for local projects funded by any source.
3. Any document setting forth personnel standards and expectations, position responsibilities, and employee training and development standards and materials.

(2) (a) Each local government that received state funding during the current or previous fiscal year must, within 7 business days after the request, provide the personnel of the Office of Policy and Budget access to:

1. Its responsive personnel and subject matter experts.
2. Its physical premises, subject to appropriate security considerations.
3. Its data systems and related data, subject to appropriate security considerations.

- (b) Nothing in this section shall be construed to require access to records that are confidential under federal or state laws.
  - (c) Failure to provide access as required in paragraph (a) may subject the local government to a fine of \$1,000 per day for noncompliance. The Executive Office of the Governor may assess a fine if such action is recommended by the Office of Policy and Budget and approved by a three-fourths vote of the Administration Commission. The assessment of a fine pursuant to this section constitutes final agency action pursuant to chapter 120, Florida Statutes. Fines collected under this subsection must be deposited into the General Revenue Fund. Fines imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall be enforced against the local government and not its employees.
  - (d) Any request for public records by the Office of Policy and Budget to a local governmental entity, a local governing authority, or a unit of local general-purpose government shall be deemed a request to inspect its public records. Enforcement of these requests shall be subject to ss. 119.11 and 119.12, Florida Statutes.
- (3) The Office of Policy and Budget shall:
- (a) Compile and submit an initial report to the Governor, the Chief Financial Officer, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by January 13, 2026. The report must, at a minimum:
    - 1. Identify each local government reviewed.
    - 2. Summarize each review.
    - 3. Provide any specific instances of the use of resources for initiatives supporting diversity, equity, and inclusion inconsistent with law.
    - 4. Provide any specific evidence of potential gross overspending, waste, fraud, abuse, or mismanagement of resources.
    - 5. Identify duplicative or redundant government functions.
    - 6. Recommend any opportunities for good governance and methods to improve fiscal responsibility and streamline government services.
  - (b) Provide the Legislative Auditing Committee any information described in subparagraph (a)4.

Nothing shall preclude the Office of Policy and Budget from engaging in additional activities in support of its duties under this section, including encouraging or receiving cooperation from a local government. This section expires July 1, 2026.

## 2025 FINAL CONFERENCE REPORT FOR SB 7022 – FLORIDA RETIREMENT SYSTEM BILL

The Conference Committee Amendment for SB 7022, relating to Retirement, establishes the contribution rates paid by employers that participate in the Florida Retirement System (FRS), beginning July 1, 2025. These rates are intended to fund the full normal cost and the amortization of the unfunded actuarial liability (UAL) of the FRS. With these modifications to employer contribution rates, the FRS Trust Fund will receive roughly \$310.2 million more in revenue on an annual basis beginning July 1, 2025, when compared to the employer contributions generated based on the current statutory contribution rates. The public employers that will incur these additional costs are state agencies, state universities and colleges, school districts, counties, municipalities, and other governmental entities that participate in the FRS. The amendment takes effect July 1, 2025.

Amends section 121.71 of Florida Statutes to revise required employer retirement contribution rates for the Florida Retirement System, effective July 1.

- Sets new rates for Regular Class at 7.10%, Special Risk Class at 20.10%, Special Risk Administrative Support Class at 10.88%, Elected Officers' Class (Legislators, Governor, etc.,) at 10.04%, Elected Officers' Class (Justices, Judges) at 15.62%, Senior Management Service Class at 8.73%, and DROP at 9.37%.
- Addresses unfunded actuarial liabilities by setting contribution rates for Regular Class at 4.87%, Special Risk Class at 13.03%, Special Risk Administrative Support Class at 26.54%, Elected Officers' Class (Justices, Judges) at 28.46%, Elected Officers' Class (County Elected Officers) at 40.72%, Senior Management Service Class at 22.45%, and DROP at 10.65%.
- Declares that extending basic protections through governmental retirement systems serves a legitimate state interest and asserts that management, administration, and funding must be actuarially sound.
