K – 12 Education Appropriation Highlights

Key Differences Between the Senate and House K-12 Education Budget

The House increases the Base Student Allocation (BSA) by \$129.11 (2.4% increase) and the Senate increases the BSA by \$50 (.93% increase). (Refer to Senate and House Statewide Summary's).

The House provides an increase of \$247.60(2.7%) in total funds per unweighted FTE, from \$9,187.36 to \$9,434.96. The Senate provides an increase of \$150.98 (1.64%) in total funds per unweighted FTE, from \$9,187.36 to \$9,338.34). (Refer to Senate and House Statewide Summary's).

The Senate increases the total FEFP funds by \$692.8 million (2.37%). The House increases the total FEF funds by \$1,003,093,937 (3.42%). (Refer to Senate and House Statewide Summary's). The House proposes an increase in the Safe Schools Allocation (Line Item 88) and a new distribution methodology without a guaranteed base amount for each school district. The House FEFP statewide summary indicates a \$158,317,689 (54.59%) increase in the Safe Schools allocation. A revised allocation method is not included in the Senate's GAA.

The Senate provides an increase in funds to the Regional Education Consortia (Line Item 102) and creates the Rural School District Supplemental Services Grant Program (Line Item 102). Not included in the House's proposed GAA.

The Senate creates a Declining Enrollment supplement, \$65,263,148, in non-recurring funds for school districts where there is a decline in the unweighted public FTE between 2024-2025 and 2025-2026. (Section 20, Back of the GAA). Not included in the House's proposed GAA.

The Senate provides \$2 million operational program funding relief for both Glades and Union County school districts due to declining enrollment operational funding challenges. (Sections 21 and 22, Back of the GAA). Not included in the House's proposed GAA.

The House rolls back the Required Local Effort, while the Senate maintains at the prior level of 3.092 mills. (Line Item 88).

HB 5003 implements the General Appropriations Act proposed by the House of Representatives for Fiscal Year 2026-2027. This implement bill changes the Educational Enrollment Stabilization program to the Family Empowerment Scholarship Stabilization program. Changes are not included in the Senate's Implementing Bill.

The House budget does not fund any Special Facilities Construction Projects (Line Item 18). The Senate provides \$369,000,242 in funding.

Both the Senate and House provide around \$100 million for teacher salary increases. However, the House's proviso language stipulates the salary increase to full-time classroom teachers and certified prekindergarten teachers with at least 20 years of full-time teaching experience in a Florida Public School (Line Item 88)

The Senate's proposed FEFP includes a designated scholarship funding allocation, \$4,482,590,649. The House's FEFP proposal does not include a scholarship funding allocation as part of the proposed FEFP.

Additionally, Senate Bill 318 Senate Educational Scholarship Programs, creates s. 1011.689, F.S., to shifting the Educational Enrollment Stabilization Program (Stabilization Fund) from s. 1011.62(18), F.S., into a new statute to modify how the funds within the Stabilization Fund may be used. The bill maintains the requirement that the Stabilization Fund provide supplemental state funds to address changes in FTE student enrollment throughout the school year in both the FEFP and state scholarship programs.

FLORIDA HOUSE COMPLETE 2026-2027 FEFP SUMMARY (February 16, 2026)

House Implementing Bill HB 5003 - K12 Highlights

HB 5003 implements the General Appropriations Act proposed by the House of Representatives for Fiscal Year 2026-2027. The bill provides the statutory authority necessary to implement and execute the General Appropriations Act, GAA for Fiscal Year 2026-2027. The statutory changes are effective for only one year and either expire on July 1, 2027, or revert to the language as it existed before the changes made by the bill. Key provisions related to prekindergarten through grade 12 education include:

Section 4 modifies the FEFP by making changes to the method used to distribute safe schools allocation funds.

(a) The safe schools allocation shall be calculated as follows:

1. For each school facility required to have a safe-school officer as prescribed by the Office of Safe Schools, the number of safe-school officers shall be determined based on the recommended ratio of unweighted full-time equivalent students per safe-school officer as specified in the General Appropriations Act.
2. Any school facility with a prior year percentage of law enforcement-reported incidents which is higher than the percentage reported in the School Environmental Safety Incident Reporting System pursuant to s. 1006.07(9), per unweighted full time equivalent student as specified in the General Appropriations Act, shall receive one additional safe-school officer.
3. The sum of safe-school officers determined under subparagraphs 1. and 2. shall be multiplied by the school district's safe schools factor as specified in the General Appropriations Act. The product shall be the school district's amount of the safe schools allocation each school district shall receive a minimum safe schools allocation in an amount provided in the General Appropriations Act. Of the remaining balance of the safe schools allocation, one-third shall be allocated to school districts based on the most recent official Florida Crime Index provided by the Department of Law Enforcement and two thirds shall be allocated based on each school district's 558 proportionate share of the state's total unweighted full-time equivalent student enrollment.

Section 4 revises the Educational Enrollment Stabilization program to the Family Empowerment Scholarship stabilization program is created to provide supplemental state funds as needed if the number of weighted full-time equivalent Family Empowerment Scholarship students in a school district is greater than the number of such students provided in the General Appropriations Act and the school district's

amount of funds per weighted full-time equivalent student is less than the amount of such funds provided in the General Appropriations Act to maintain the stability of the operations of public schools in each school district and to protect districts, including charter schools, from financial instability as a result of changes in full-time equivalent student enrollment throughout the school year.

(b) The Legislature may shall annually appropriate funds in the General Appropriations Act to the Department of Education for this program in an amount necessary to fully fund the number of eligible Family Empowerment Scholarship students.

(c) The stabilization fund amount for each school district shall be calculated as follows:

1. Subtract from the current number of weighted full-time equivalent Family Empowerment Scholarship students the appropriated number of weighted full-time equivalent Family Empowerment Scholarship students.

2. Subtract from the appropriated amount of funds per weighted full-time equivalent student the current amount of funds per weighted full-time equivalent student.

3. If both amounts calculated in subparagraphs 1. and 2. are greater than zero, multiply the difference calculated in subparagraph 1. by the appropriated amount of funds per weighted full-time equivalent student and multiply the difference calculated in subparagraph 2. by the current number of weighted full-time equivalent students.

4. The lesser of the two amounts calculated in subparagraph 3. equals the amount of the school district's stabilization fund.

5. If the total of school district stabilization funds for all districts is greater than the amounts appropriated for the program, each school district's allocation shall be prorated based on its proportionate share of the calculated amount.

(d) The funding for the family empowerment scholarship stabilization program shall be recalculated during the fiscal year based on actual full-time equivalent student membership maintain a projected minimum balance of \$250 million at the beginning of the upcoming fiscal year. The Department of Education shall use funds as appropriated to ensure that based on each recalculation of the Florida Education Finance Program pursuant to paragraph (1)(a), a school district's funds per unweighted full-time equivalent student are not less than the greater of either the school district's funds per unweighted full-time equivalent student as appropriated

in the General Appropriations Act or the school district's funds per unweighted full-time equivalent student as recalculated based upon the receipt of the certified taxable value for school purposes pursuant to s. 1011.62(4).

Senate Education Conforming Bill 2514 - Prekindergarten Through Grade 12 Education Highlights

SPB 2514 conforms to the funding decisions related to prekindergarten through grade 12 Education in the Senate-proposed General Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2026-2027.

The bill:

- Revises conditions under which a specified scholarship account's funds revert to the state;
- Provides a supplement for districts that have a decline in enrollment;
- Requiring that fiscally constrained districts receive a higher calculation than non-fiscally constrained districts, etc.

(20) DECLINING ENROLLMENT SUPPLEMENT.—In those districts where there is a decline between prior year and current year unweighted FTE students, the percentage of the decline in the unweighted FTE students, as specified in the General Appropriations Act, shall be multiplied by the current year base amount for the Florida Education Finance Program, as determined in paragraph (1)(n), per unweighted FTE student and shall be added to the allocation for that district. The percentage used for districts that are fiscally constrained must be greater than the percentage used for non-fiscally constrained districts.

Senate Proposed Bill 2500 – Back of the Bill Language:

Section 20. There is hereby appropriated for Fiscal Year 2025-2026, \$65,263,148 in nonrecurring funds from the General Revenue Fund to the Department of Education for the declining enrollment supplement for school districts. In those school districts where there is a decline in unweighted public FTE students between 2024-2025 and 2025-2026, 14.5 percent of the decline in the unweighted public FTE students shall be multiplied by the 2025-2026 base amount for the Florida Education Finance Program per unweighted public FTE student. These funds shall be prorated to the amount appropriated in this section and shall be in addition to the funds provided in the FEFP. This section is effective upon becoming a law.
